***MINUTES OF A REGULAR MEETING OF
BIG BEAR MUNICIPAL WATER DISTRICT
HELD ON THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 20, 2025***

1. OPEN SESSION

President Brewster opened the regularly scheduled Board meeting at 1:00 PM at the Big Bear Municipal Water District located at 40524 Lakeview Drive, Big Bear Lake, CA 92315 on Thursday November 20, 2025.

2. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

3. PUBLIC FORUM

No comments were made.

4. REPORTS

- A. Jared Cheek, General Manager, reported meeting with California Fish & Wildlife regarding the five-year lake and streambed permit extension. He noted that nesting bird season is now year-round and confirmed that a permit is required for willow tree removal, which he is coordinating with CDFW. He attended the Marina Task Force meeting and reported that the dam survey has been completed and submitted to DSOD, with the next survey due in five years. He also attended the RTAC meeting virtually hosted by the Big Bear Chamber of Commerce with other local agencies. A meeting with Visit Big Bear was held to review the special event permit application process and reiterate expectations. Two maintenance staff members completed an educational electrical training in San Diego which was very beneficial. He also met with Southwest Gas regarding their plan to abandon a 4" pipeline that crosses the lake. Himself and fellow staff member, Mike Kent provided a presentation to the BBHS EdTrust AP History class on career paths. He attended the General Manager meeting and breakfast at the San Bernardino County district to discuss local projects. For launch activity, November recorded 134 launches, bringing the season total to 9,575.
- B. Director Lee reported that the Operations Committee met and marina operations are running smoothly and relations among marinas continue to be positive. Mussel inspections remain effective, and no new invasive species have been detected. He inquired about a newly identified mussel species on the East Coast.

President Brewster raised concerns about vessels with ballasts and wake capabilities, General Manager Cheek noted initial concepts included establishing special-use areas and limiting access times, with water depth being an important consideration. General

Manager Cheek recommended holding a workshop with the public and key stakeholders, namely marinas and businesses, to develop options.

Director Ludecke asked about the three BUIs issued this season, and General Manager Cheek clarified that these were only cases that MWD was involved in and not reflective of the Sheriff's full enforcement record.

He confirmed that the underlying contract terms were previously approved through existing resolutions and that the current action retroactively aligns the documentation with CalPERS standards. Counsel also stated that the fiscal impact to the District is zero and that the same is expected for Items 6B and 6C.

Conduct Research. The consultant must review all pertinent background information, including, but not limited to, City Council strategic plan goals and community visioning results, and incorporate these into the update effort.
